Spiritual Reflection – Twelfth Sunday in Ordinary Time

IN THE STORMS OF LIFE, WE CRY OUT, "LORD, SAVE US," FOR WE KNOW WE NEED HIM

A Spiritual Reflection by Pope Francis, Angelus Message, June 20, 2021

Today's Liturgy tells the episode of the storm calmed by Jesus (Mk 4:35-41). The boat in which the disciples are crossing the lake is beaten by the wind and the waves and they fear they will sink. Jesus is with them on the boat, yet he is in the stern asleep on the cushion. Filled with fear, the disciples cry out to him: "Teacher, do you not care if we perish?" (v. 38).

And quite often we too, beaten by the trials of life, have cried out to the Lord: "Why do you remain silent and do nothing for me?" Especially when it seems we are sinking, because love or the project in which we had laid great hopes disappears; or when we are at the mercy of unrelenting waves of anxiety; or when we feel we are drowning in problems or lost amid the sea of life, with no course and no harbor. Or even, in moments in which the strength to go forward fails us, because we have no job, or an unexpected diagnosis makes us fear for our health or that of a loved one. There are many moments when we feel we are in a storm; when we feel we are almost done in.

In these situations, and in many others, we too feel suffocated by fear and, like the disciples, risk losing sight of the most important thing. In the boat, in fact, even if he is sleeping, Jesus is there, and he shares with his own all that is happening. If on the one hand his slumber surprises us, on the other, it puts us to the test. The Lord is there, present; indeed, he waits — so to speak — for us to engage him, to invoke him, to put him at the center of what we are experiencing. His slumber causes us to wake up. Because to be disciples of Jesus, it is not enough to believe God is there, that he exists, but we must put ourselves out there with him; we must also raise our voice with him. Hear this: we must cry out to him. Prayer is often a cry: "Lord, save me!" I was watching, on the program "In His Image," today, the Day of Refugees, many who come in large boats and at the moment of drowning cry out: "Save us!" In our life too the same thing happens: "Lord, save us!", and prayer becomes a cry.

Today we can ask ourselves: what are the winds that beat against my life? What are the waves that hinder my navigation, and put my spiritual life, my family life, even my psychological life in danger? Let us say all this to Jesus; let us tell him everything. He wants this; he wants us to grab hold of him to find shelter from the unexpected waves in life. The Gospel recounts that the disciples approach Jesus, wake him and speak to him (cf. v. 38). This is the beginning of our faith: to recognize that alone we are unable to stay afloat; that we need Jesus like sailors need the stars to find their course. Faith begins from believing that we are not enough for ourselves, from feeling in need of God. When we overcome the temptation to close ourselves off, when we overcome the false religiosity that does not want to disturb God, when we cry out to him, he can work wonders in us. It is the gentle and extraordinary power of prayer, which works miracles. Jesus, begged by the disciples, calms the wind and waves. And he asks them a question, a question which also pertains to us: "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?" (v. 40). The disciples were gripped with fear, because they were focused on the waves more than on looking at Jesus. And fear leads us to look at the difficulties, the awful problems, and not to look at the Lord, who many times is sleeping. It is this way for us too: how often we remain fixated on problems rather than going to the Lord and casting our concerns to him! How often we leave the Lord in a corner, at the bottom of the boat of life, to wake him only in a moment of need! Today, let us ask for the grace of a faith that never tires of seeking the Lord, of knocking at the door of his Heart.

May the Virgin Mary, who in her life never stopped trusting in God, reawaken in us the basic need of entrusting ourselves to him each day.

DOCEAVA SEMANA EN TIEMPO ORDINARIO

EN LAS TORMENTAS DE LA VIDA, GRITAMOS: "SEÑOR, SÁLVANOS", PORQUE SABEMOS QUE LO NECESITAMOS

Una reflexión espiritual del Papa Francisco, Mensaje del Ángelus, 20 de junio de 2021

La Liturgia de hoy cuenta el episodio de la tormenta apaciguada por Jesús (Mc 4:35-41). El barco en el que los discípulos estaban cruzando el lago estaba siendo golpeado por el viento y las olas y temían que se hundiera. Jesús estaba con ellos en el barco, pero estaba durmiendo en la parte trasera sobre el cojín. Llenos de miedo, los discípulos le gritan: "Profesor, ¿no te importa si perecemos?" (V. 38).

Y muy a menudo nosotros también, golpeados por las pruebas de la vida, hemos gritado al Señor: "¿Por qué permaneces en silencio y no haces nada por mí?" Especialmente cuando parece que nos estamos hundiendo, porque el amor o el proyecto en el que habíamos puesto grandes esperanzas desaparece; o cuando estamos a merced de olas implacables de ansiedad; o cuando sentimos que nos estamos ahogando en problemas o perdidos en medio del mar de la vida, sin rumbo y sin puerto. O incluso, en momentos en los que la fuerza para seguir adelante nos falla, porque no tenemos trabajo, o un diagnóstico inesperado nos hace temer por nuestra salud o la de un ser querido. Hay muchos momentos en los que sentimos que estamos en una tormenta; en los que sentimos que casi hemos terminado.

En estas situaciones, y en muchas otras, nosotros también nos sentimos asfixiados por el miedo y, al igual que los discípulos, corremos el riesgo de perder de vista lo más importante. En el barco, de hecho, incluso si está durmiendo, Jesús está allí, y comparte con los suyos todo lo que está sucediendo. Si, por un lado, su sueño nos sorprende, por otro, nos pone a prueba. El Señor está allí, presente; de hecho, espera, por así decirlo, a que lo involucremos, lo invoquemos y lo pongamos en el centro de lo que estamos experimentando. Su sueño nos hace despertar. Porque ser discípulos de Jesús, no es suficiente creer que Dios está allí, que existe, pero debemos ponernos ahí fuera con él; también debemos levantar la voz con él. Escucha esto: debemos gritarle. La oración es a menudo un grito: "¡Señor, sálvame!" Hoy estaba viendo, en el programa "In His Image", el Día de los Refugiados, muchos de los que vienen en grandes barcos y en el momento de ahogarse le gritaron: "¡Sálvanos!" En nuestra vida también sucede lo mismo: "¡Señor, sálvanos!", y la oración se convierte en un grito.

Hoy podemos preguntarnos: ¿cuáles son los vientos que laten contra mi vida? ¿Cuáles son las olas que obstaculizan mi navegación y ponen en peligro mi vida espiritual, mi vida familiar, incluso mi vida psicológica? Digámosle todo esto a Jesús; Él quiere esto; quiere que lo agarremos para encontrar refugio de las olas inesperadas de la vida. El Evangelio cuenta que los discípulos se acercan a Jesús, lo despiertan y le hablan (cf. v. 38). Este es el comienzo de nuestra fe: reconocer que solos somos incapaces de mantenernos a flote; que necesitamos a Jesús como los marineros necesitan las estrellas para encontrar su rumbo. La fe comienza por creer que no somos suficientes para nosotros mismos, por sentir la necesidad de Dios. Cuando superamos la tentación de cerrarnos, cuando superamos la falsa religiosidad que no quiere molestar a Dios, cuando le gritamos, él puede hacer maravillas en nosotros. Es el poder suave y extraordinario de la oración, el que hace milagros.

Jesús, suplicado por los discípulos, calma el viento y las olas. Y les hace una pregunta, una pregunta que también nos pertenece a nosotros: "¿Por qué tienes miedo? ¿No tienes fe?" (V. 40). Los discípulos estaban atrapados por el miedo, porque estaban más centrados en las olas que en mirar a Jesús. Y el miedo nos lleva a ver las dificultades, los terribles problemas, y no a mirar al Señor, que muchas veces está durmiendo. Es así para nosotros también: ¡con qué frecuencia nos mantenemos obsesionados con los problemas en lugar de ir al Señor y expresar nuestras preocupaciones hacia él! ¡Cuántas veces dejamos al Señor en una esquina, en el fondo del barco de la vida, para despertarlo solo en un momento de necesidad! Hoy, pidamos la gracia de una fe que nunca se cansa de buscar al Señor, de llamar a la puerta de su Corazón.

Que la Virgen María, que en su vida nunca ha dejado de confiar en Dios, despierte en nosotros la necesidad básica de confiarnos en él cada día.


